1. INTRODUCTION

1.1_ PURPOSE

The purpose of this Emergency Support Function (ESF) is to provide for the coordination of local resources in response to pet, farm and wildlife care needs before, during, and following a significant natural disaster or manmade event. The Manatee County Animal Services Division directs assistance provided under ESF 17 - Animal Issues.

1.2 SCOPE

Overall management, coordination and prioritization of County wide Animal Services and assets to support pet, farm, and wildlife needs if there is a major emergency or disaster. Animal related services under this Annex are categorized in the following functional areas with agency responsibility being assigned.

1.2.1 INVESTIGATE ANIMAL BITES AND ASSIST WITH RABIES CONTROL

1.3 ORGANIZATION

They generally overlook animal issues in the planning process for pre, during, and post disasters. This lack of planning, caused by the belief that animals can fend for themselves, leads to serious problems when these animals are forced from their habitats due to injury and hunger. By developing operational procedures to care for these animals before such an event, this ESF will reduce the health and safety risk and the resource drain on other County ESF's.

2. POLICIES

2.1 ASSIGNMENT OF RESPONSIBILITIES

2.1.1 PRIMARY AGENCIES

2.1.1.1 The Manatee County Animal Services Division is designated as the team leader for this ESF and is responsible for the following:

2.1.1.2 Notifying, activating and mobilizing all agencies assigned to the ESF.

2.1.1.3 Coordinating all support agency actions in performance of missions assigned to this ESF.

2.1.1.4 Coordinating requests for assistance and additional resources necessary during performance of the mission with the appropriate agencies.

2.1.1.5 Functioning as the County's representative/liasion to the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) Team for the activities and responsibilities carried out by the primary and support agencies of this ESF.

2.1.1.6 Investigating all animal bites.

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- 2.1.1.7 Facilitating the transportation of injured, stray, or nuisance animals to animal care facilities.
- 2.1.1.8 Assisting emergency response teams with animal related problems.
- 2.1.1.9 Arranging for the removal and disposal of dead animals.
- 2.1.1.10 Coordination with the Manatee County Emergency Management Division for the release of public information regarding animals and related health issues.
- 2.1.1.11 Enforcing the Manatee County Animal Ordinance.
- 2.1.1.12 Quarantining bite animals for observation.
- 2.1.1.13 Impounding animals at large.
- 2.1.1.14 Euthanasia of sick and/or injured animals through assigned and authorized persons.
- 2.1.1.15 Returning wild animals to their natural environment.
- 2.1.1.16 Responding to animal related inquires.
- 2.1.1.17 Investigating animal cruelty and neglect complaints.
- 2.1.2 SUPPORT AGENCIES (GENERAL)
 - 2.1.2.1 All support agencies of the ESF are responsible for the following:
 - 2.1.2.2 Notifying, activating and mobilizing all personnel and equipment to perform or support assigned functions as designated within the Basic Plan and the response actions of this ESF
 - 2.1.2.3 Designation and assigning personnel for staffing of all facilities at which this ESF is required, and providing representation when it is determined by the primary agency of the ESF to be necessary.

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- 2.1.2.4 Coordinating all actions of the support agency with the primary agency when performing the assigned missions of this ESF.
- 2.1.2.5 Identifying all personnel and resource requirements to perform assigned missions that are greater than the support agencies' capabilities.
- 2.1.3 DIVISION OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT/COMMUNICATIONS
 - 2.1.3.1 Providing initial notification to the primary agencies of this ESF for the need to implement all or portions of this ESF.
 - 2.1.3.2 Assisting in coordinating requests for support from this ESF between other ESF's represented in the EOC.
 - 2.1.3.3 Continual improvement and refinement of this ESF.
- 2.1.4 FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE
 - 2.1.4.1 Provide management and care of farm animals.
- 2.1.5 FLORIDA GAME AND FRESHWATER FISH COMMISSION
 - 2.1.5.1 Provide for the management and care of wild animals, including protected and endangered animals.
- 2.1.6 MYAKKA RIVER RYDERS
 - 2.1.6.1 Provide a Disaster Animal Relief Team (DART)
 - 2.1.6.2 Maintain equipment and resources necessary to manage livestock and domestic animals in a disaster situation.
 - 2.1.6.3 To facilitate and optimize the work of DART veterinarians.
 - 2.1.6.4 Provide or arrange the transportation of livestock and domestic animals in the aftermath of a disaster.
 - 2.1.6.5 Assist in the establishment of housing for livestock and displaced animals.
 - 2.1.6.6 Provide a MASH unit for the medical care of injured/sick animals

2.2 RESPONSE REQUIREMENTS

Federal and State assistance to the Emergency Support Function will be provided under Florida Statute Chapter 252. The primary and support agencies of this ESF must plan to be as self sufficient as feasibly possible during the first 72 hours following an event, as there may be limited assistance.

2.3 RESOURCE COORDINATION

2.3.1 This ESF will provide animal assistance resources using its primary and support agency authorities and capabilities and via coordination with other ESF's to support its missions. This ESF will allocate available resources to each mission based upon priorities identified by the Emergency Operations Center Management Team. If animal assistance resources are unavailable within this ESF, the ESF will directly request assistance from it's corresponding ESF at the State EOC or Disaster Field Office.

2.3.2 All other ESF's will coordinate with this ESF's representatives at the County's EOC when requesting emergency support or disaster assistance from this ESF. If a conflict of priorities develops, this ESF will work directly with the EOC Management Team to resolve the situation.

2.4 RECOVERY OPERATIONS

Although this annex addresses recovery activities of the agencies associated with this ESF, the Emergency Operations Center representative for this ESF is responsible for coordinating all recovery activities to provide animal assistance services to the affected area in the County, as required. Therefore, recovery operations of this ESF will be initiated commensurate with emergency priorities within the County and based on the availability of resources.

2.5 OPERATING FACILITIES

2.5.1 The Chief of Manatee County Animal Services or his/her designee will operate this ESF table at the Emergency Operations Center and be part of the Management Team. All animal related issues will be channeled through this table for response and resource coordination.

2.5.1.1 OTHER OPERATING FACILITIES

2.5.1.1.1 Dispatch location as designated.

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- 2.5.1.1.2 Field sites for other governmental agencies as required.
- 2.5.1.1.3 Designated Animal Shelter Sites will be first utilized and they will identify additional shelters as the situation requires.
- 2.5.1.1.4 Resource stockpile and Staging Sites to be identified as the situation requires.

2.6 COORDINATION OF ACTIONS

- 2.6.1 All agencies assigned with this ESF will coordinate all actions in performance of disaster assistance missions with representation assigned by Manatee County Animal Services to the Emergency Operations Center.

3. SITUATION

3.1 DISASTER CONDITIONS

- 3.1.1 A significant natural or manmade disaster event could quickly overwhelm local government's resources and capabilities in providing the necessary services that would require the need for State and/or Federal assistance. Such a disaster would pose certain public health and nuisance threats such as injured and displaced animals, dead animals, rabies and other animal related diseases, care and shelter, and other animal problems. Additionally, these problems could tax the human need's response and resources.

3.1.1.1 ANIMAL RELIEF PHASE

This phase would be the actual pre-event care and sheltering of the animals.

3.1.1.2 SHORT TERM RECOVERY PHASE

During this phase, animal issue related services support furnished by this ESF will become more generalized with every attempt being made to verify the need before providing assistance. However, it may be necessary to proceed with assistance on a limited basis before verification is obtained. Additionally, due to the complexity of injured, dead, and nuisance animal problems, conditions may require special expert advisory groups. These

advisory groups will review health, medical, sustenance, and safety information and will advise specific strategies to manage and respond to these situations.

3.1.1.3 LONG TERM RECOVERY PHASE

Long term animal related service requirements to return animals to their owners, natural environment, long term health recovery, and proper disposal of carcasses.

3.2 PLANNING ASSUMPTIONS

- 3.2.1 Human lives may be lost due to the refusal to evacuate without their pets or livestock. Public education by the County and animal related organizations are necessary to make the people aware of pet sheltering facilities available.
- 3.2.2 Many homeless/injured pets, livestock, and wild animals. This would be a health and nuisance or bite threat that would require a response to address the capture and subsequent sheltering of these animals.
- 3.2.3 Triage and treatment of sick and injured animals to include euthanasia, if necessary. Veterinarians at designated shelters and private offices would accomplish this, or authorized Animal Services personnel.
- 3.2.4 Inadequate food supplies. Prior arrangement with vendors would import commercial pet/livestock food into the County. Various wild animal groups and State agencies would organize food drops for wild animals.
- 3.2.5 Accumulation of shelter animal waste and carcasses. Removal of the material to approved solid waste landfill sites.
- 3.2.6 Accumulation of animal carcasses throughout the County. Removal to approved solid waste landfill sites and/or burning on site.
- 3.2.7 Shelter animals to be reunited with their owners after the disaster.

4 CONCEPT OF OPERATIONS

4.1 GENERAL

All requests for Animal Services assistance will be channeled through the EOC, then sent to the designated dispatch center.

4.2 EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER

At the time of activation of the EOC, this ESF will be staffed on a 24-hour schedule to interface and communicate with other agencies and prioritize assistance requests.

4.3 EMERGENCY SUPPORT FUNCTION ORGANIZATION

4.3.1 FEDERAL/STATE/REGIONAL LEVEL

Should this ESF be recognized by the Federal and State Recovery Plans, it will be represented at the Federal Disaster Field Office, and will be present at the State EOC. In addition, when a Regional reception and staging area have been established, representation of this ESF at that location will be initiated.

4.3.2 COUNTY LEVEL

The Manatee County Animal Services Chief or his/her designee at the EOC is responsible for all activity of the ESF, subject only to the guidance and direction of the Emergency Management Team, and the policies of this plan.

4.3.3 MUNICIPAL LEVEL

Municipal agencies that may or may not perform like functions must coordinate with this ESF in the Emergency Operations Center.

4.3.4 VOLUNTEER AGENCIES

All volunteer animal issue agencies will coordinate directly with this ESF at the Emergency Operations Center.

4.4 NOTIFICATION

4.4.1 INITIAL

Initial notification will be sent by the EOC to the Manatee County Animal Services Division as the primary agency of this ESF.

4.4.2 PRIMARY AGENCIES

As the primary agency, Manatee County Animal Services will notify all support agencies to begin mobilization of resources and personnel, and to commence operations assigned to this ESF.

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4.4.3 **SUPPORT AGENCIES**

Support agencies will begin mobilization of support personnel and resources.

4.5 MOBILIZATION

4.5.1 **PRIMARY AGENCIES**

4.5.1.1 Immediately following notification to activate this ESF, Manatee County Animal Services will complete the following:

4.5.1.1.1 Assure necessary emergency operation facilities and reporting systems are established

4.5.1.1.2 Establish communications with the EOC and obtain a status report

4.5.1.1.3 Provide appropriate representation to the EOC

4.5.2 **SUPPORT AGENCIES**

4.5.2.1 Immediately following notification by the Manatee County Animal Services Division to commence response actions for this ESF, each support agency will complete the following:

4.5.2.1.1 Staff facilities as required

4.5.2.1.2 Provide for a call down of each agency's staff. Provide for ongoing needs concerning each agency's designated area of responsibility.

4.5.1.1.3 Provide personnel and resources for assessment and field teams as required.

5. RESPONSE ACTIONS

5.1 ANIMAL RELIEF PHASE

This ESF will immediately identify, mobilize, and deploy an assessment team(s) to the disaster area(s) to determine the specific health and safety needs and priorities.

This ESF will coordinate with the other ESF's represented at the EOC to provide support to aid in the relief of nuisance and health related problems involving animals and their impact on human relief efforts.

5.2 SHORT TERM RECOVERY PHASE

- 5.2.1. This ESF will continue to provide assistance in the following areas:
 - 5.2.1.1 Capture of injured and displaced animals, their sheltering, medical care, feeding, relocation, and reunification with owners.
 - 5.2.1.2 Acquisition of additional food and supplies from vendors to support the relief efforts.
 - 5.2.1.3 Continued coordination with other ESF's for timely and proper carcass disposal.

5.3 LONG TERM RECOVERY PHASE

- 5.3.1 Continued care of sheltered animals and provide an extended network for the adoption of unclaimed animals.
- 5.3.2 Relocation of sick and injured animals to permanent facilities.
- 5.3.3 Return to normal operations.

6. POST DISASTER PRIORITY LIST

- 6.1** When Manatee County Animal Services is operating under emergency conditions, calls for service will be answered in the following order of priority:
 - 6.1.1 Bites, epidemiology, quarantine (health and safety)
 - 6.1.2 Animals causing a direct threat to persons (safety)
 - 6.1.3 Injured animals
 - 6.1.4 Animals at large
 - 6.1.5 Strays held by individuals
 - 6.1.6 Cruelty complaints (with the Humane Society)
 - 6.1.7 Dead animals
 - 6.1.8 Regular patrol
 - 6.1.9 Nuisance complaints (non-threatening)

6.1.10 Owner surrendered animals

7. **RESPONSIBILITIES**

7.1 ANIMAL SERVICES SUPERVISOR

The Manatee county Animal Services Division provides county wide animal related service. The Animal Services Supervisor, or designee, will serve as an Animal Services Coordinator

7.1.1 The Animal Services Supervisor will:

7.1.1.1 Coordinate the county wide provision of animal service requests

7.1.1.2 Submit requests for support and other relevant information as necessary

7.1.1.3 Coordinate the county wide provision of animal service support

7.1.1.4 Assist other County services in providing assistance to people affected by a disaster

7.1.1.5 Assist emergency response teams with animal related problems

7.1.1.6 Arrange for the removal or disposal of dangerous or dead animals

7.2 POST DISASTER PROCEDURES

7.2.1 Upon notification by the Animal Services Chief, the Animal Services Supervisor will ascertain the extent of damages to the Animal Services Facility. If dispatch operations can be used at the facility, the Animal Services Supervisor will contact all Animal Services personnel, by radio if possible, and instruct them to respond immediately to the Animal Services Facility in Palmetto. Should the extent of damages to the Animal Services Facility prohibit dispatch operations at the facility, the Animal Services Supervisor will choose a dispatch center location, and oversee all necessary operational arrangements, such as a temporary telephone line hook up, dispatch console assembly, etc. to establish a functional dispatch operations center as soon as possible.

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- 7.2.2 In this case, the Animal Services Supervisor will contact all Animal Services personnel and instruct them to report immediately to any temporary Animal Services Dispatch Center.

7.3 POST DISASTER ANIMAL SERVICES

- 7.3.1 The highest priorities for all county operations following a disaster will be to save lives and protect property of the citizens of the county. Therefore, the first effort by the Animal Services Division will be to provide assistance to departments involved in those activities. This may include using Animal Services vehicles in conducting reconnaissance of areas of Manatee County to which they may be assigned.
- 7.3.2 It also must be recognized that the care of injured, dead and displaced animals can become a significant health and safety issue after a disaster. Because of this, the Animal Services Division must balance its support of other functions with its primary mission to attend to the need of animals throughout the county after a disaster.
- 7.3.3 They will consider the possibility of establishing temporary facilities in the area where the greatest need for animal services exists in addition to the permanent facility.

7.4 OBJECTIVES

- 7.4.1 This procedure describes the concepts and policies used in providing animal services after a disaster has occurred.
- 7.4.2 The objectives of post-disaster Animal Services operations will be to:
 - 7.4.2.1 Transport animals to shelters and animal assistance stations for housing and treatment.
 - 7.4.2.2 Provide rabies control
 - 7.4.2.3 Remove or dispose of dangerous or dead animals
 - 7.4.2.4 Assist emergency response teams with animal related problems

8. INSTRUCTIONS FOR ANIMAL ASSISTANCE TEAMS

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- 8.1** Identify yourself.
- 8.2** Accomplish emergency tasks. Once emergency tasks have been completed follow up for additional assistance that may be required.
- 8.3** Annotate the work accomplished on the worksheet.
- 8.4** Maintain contact with the command center. An appointed person in charge of your section should always be aware of the location of all work teams.
- 8.5** **NOTE:** Under no circumstances will you work in unsafe areas, i.e., live electrical lines, hazardous chemical spills, etc.
- 8.6** Contact the distribution center when you have finished one job and are en route to the next, or are finished for the day.
- 8.7** Once you see the damaged area you can make an accurate assessment of the disaster and determine what assistance will be needed.
- 8.8** Every personal precaution must be taken when entering a damaged building or area.
- 8.9** Work shoes/boots, hard hat, goggles, gloves, and other safety gear are required before entering a damaged structure. Be sure the area is clear of live wires and standing water.
- 8.10** When parking your vehicle, do not block access of other emergency vehicles. Do not block driveways, intersections, fire hydrants, etc. Lock your vehicle before leaving the area.
- 8.11** Should you identify other emergency needs other than animal related, refer the situation to the person appointed as in charge of your area so that other relief agencies may be contacted.
- 8.12** They can conduct emergency first aid, however treatment and advise should only be given by a qualified veterinarian.
- 8.13** Both victims and workers are all under stress, tired and uncomfortable when a disaster occurs. Always be polite, this especially applies if other emergency agencies or the media question you. Be diplomatic with your responses and do not divulge confidential information regarding anyone's property. Requests for specific information should be directed to the proper Animal Services authority.

9. EXPENDITURES AND RECORD KEEPING

9.1 A catastrophic emergency will require the expenditure of large sums of unbudgeted local funds. Finance operations will be carried out under compressed schedules and political pressures, which will require expeditious purchases without lessening the requirement for sound financial management and accountability.

9.1.1 Manatee County Animal Services will be responsible for organizing this ESF to provide financial support for the operations in accordance with the accounting systems established by the County Purchasing and Finance. Animal Services will also be responsible for maintaining appropriate documentation to support requests for reimbursement, submitting bills in a timely fashion, and closing out mission assignments.

9.1.2 The approval to expend funds for response and recovery operations will be given by the Animal Services Division Chief or his/her designee. The Chief or his/her designee will be responsible for ensuring that actions taken and costs incurred are consistent with missions identified in the Plan.

9.1.3 Animal Services is responsible for establishing effective administrative controls to guide the expenditure of funds. Care must be taken throughout the emergency to maintain logs, records, and file copies of all expenditures to provide reasonable accountability and justification for Federal reimbursement. Animal Services is also responsible for maintaining records, receipts, and all other documentation necessary to support claims, purchases reimbursements and disbursements. This record keeping is also necessary to simplify final close out and support post emergency audits.

9.1.4 The Animal Services Division will maintain detailed records of the following types of cost, which we may incur in providing requested assistance:

9.1.4.1 Wages (regular and overtime), travel and per diem of permanent and temporary personnel assigned solely to provide assistance.

9.1.4.2 Costs of work, materials, and services procured under contract to support implementation of recovery efforts.

9.1.4.3 Costs of materials, equipment, and supplies (including transportation, maintenance, repair, etc.) from regular local inventories

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- 9.1.4.4 Costs incurred which they pay from reserves, trust, revolving, or other fund, whose reimbursement is required by law.
- 9.1.4.5 Other costs incurred to provide assistance or otherwise simplify recovery efforts, as directed by the Governor's Authorized Representative.
