 - Deland-Volusia Co., Bartow Polk Co., Moore Haven Glades Co.
 - 84 total participants
 - Certificate of attendance
- \$15,000 total seed money from Florida Farm Bureau County Action Partnership grant awarded to Pasco County Farm Bureau, UF/IFAS Extension, Pasco County Sheriff Office
- Grant from FDACS in 2013 to fund full curriculum development and pilot
- Pilot Program August 2014
- Initial offering March 2015




Body Condition Scoring

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Many physiological functions in horses are influenced by body condition including horse's maintenance, reproductive and exercising requirements. A system called Body Condition Scoring can be used to rate ideal body condition. This condition scoring system is based on visual appraisal and palpable fat cover on six areas of your horse's body.





Look at the: Neck, withers, behind the shoulder, ribs, loin, and tailhead

Body Condition Scoring



A. 1 B. 2 C. 3 D. 4 E. 5

Responsibilities Associated with Equine Ownership and Management

- Understand the horse's nutritional needs
- Provide adequate foot care and grooming
- Familiar with common horse diseases and parasites
- Familiar with signs of lameness, pain, distress (creates some challenges)
